Adriana Bialostozky, M.D., was born in Mexico City where she obtained her Medical Diploma at the Universidad Nacional Autónoma de México. Her research has focused on access to care for children of migrant farm workers. Dr. Bialostozky joined the Division of General Pediatrics at Vanderbilt with a commitment to develop a clinic for Spanish speaking patients and to train residents in the care of the Latino patient. Her research focused on the Latino population, particularly concerning their access to care. Her area of interest is general pediatrics, cultural competency and health of Latino population.

He is currently the clinical psychologist at Athena Consulting and Psychological Services.

In Nashville, her focus has been largely on victims of violence and refugee/immigrant populations. She is an Associate Director of Vanderbilt's Institute for Global Health focusing on community health in three primary areas: displaced persons, violence against women as a public health concern, and addressing health care worker shortages in resource limited settings.

Kim Roberts, LPC, CEAP, SPHR, is the Community Care Coordinator for HealthSpring. Prior to working at HealthSpring, she was the director of programs at Mental Health Association of Middle Tennessee. In her role at MHAMT, Roberts provided oversight of agency clinical services, conducted educational programs on mental health/illness topics and maintained community liason, consultation and referral services.
